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Exhibitors... a sneak preview:
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Gilo Holtzman - Urban Agritecture; agri-housing: a synergy between agriculture and domestic living – a design concept that speculates on a new urban order by creating a place for socio-enviro ecological belonging between the building occupants and the locals through the cultivation of food for sustaining city living. Jessica Robertson – Slow Palette; Slow Fashion and Textile Design – a semi-couture womenswear fashion collection produced in a Slow Design framework. In opposition of the current Fast Fashion system built on mass production, mass consumption and mass disposal – Slow Palette is created using traditional, sustainable and ethical techniques, products and practices that are Local, Transparent and Collaborative. Sara Spence - "Love Bottle"; A compostable bottle made from PLA (polylactide) being commercially developed for H2GO. Polylactides are plant based and thereby remove the petrochemicals that are common in most other plastics. Incorporated within this design is the intent to promote communication, interaction and awareness through senses and design achieving a sense of responsibilty. So that, If we look after a product which we use on a regular basis and ensure it is used responsibly, we are showing signs of product love and respect. (jpg3)

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Renzo Barriga-Larriviere - 'The Fire Cube' This proposal is for a shelter that can provide fire safety during a bushfire attack and that delivers an innovative solution that is affordable, socially and environmentally relevant to the bush-life values and provides an alternative to drastic measures such as concrete bunkers or underground shelters, thus promoting the ownership of a fire shelter without imposing a major or unnecessary-perceived economic investment. John Xin Dong Che - "HALO" LED Surgical Light; The revolutionary surgical light from future - conceptual surgical light substitutes HighPower LED's over halogen lights to offer efficient illumination with consistent and stable lighting in the surgical field. LED has longer service life, 30% reduction in energy consumption and being made out recyclable aluminum achieves a higher level of environmental sustainability. (jpg5)
